History

The Washington Immigrant Network (WIN) started as an initiative by Lorraine Lee, Chief Administrative Law Judge of the Office of Administrative Hearings (OAH), which serves as the sponsoring agency. Judge Lee convened meetings to organize WIN in early 2017, inviting state workers interested in forming a Business Resource Group (BRG) for immigrant state workers.

WIN officially began on June 8, 2018, with a kickoff event at the Governor's Mansion. For the inaugural year, Christine Stalie served as chair, Nam Nguyen served as co-chair, and Kim Sauer served as secretary.

Monthly Meetings



In 2020-21, WIN held 10 monthly meetings from August 2020 to July 2021. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, WIN met online via Zoom or Microsoft Teams for all of its meetings. Meetings typically lasted an hour-long on the first Tuesday of the month.

WIN has an email circulation list with over 250 contacts who have participated in WIN meetings over the years. Of this, approximately 30 to 40 regularly attend monthly meetings consistently. From August 2020 to July 2021, we held virtual meetings only.



Social Hours-Networking Meetings



Over the fiscal year 2020-2021, WIN hosted four Social Hour/Networking Meetings to help better connect its members. These meetings changed in structure and topic but generally centered around enabling the WIN community in organizing themselves to be better suited towards success in the process of state government or connecting with one another.



Special Project-Diversity Cookbook

A special project for 2020-2021 was to develop a cultural book and the project was to celebrate the value of diversity and to engage and connect with Washington state employees and allies by sharing food recipes from all over the world, as well as traditions and cultures e project received excellent participation from across state agencies, from large ones like DSHS and Department of Transportation to smaller agencies and commissions and school districts. Outreach for the project also included the state's SmartHealth wellness portal, which incentivizes employees to earn points when they make healthy and positive life choices.

Ultimately we received more than 100 recipe submissions and published 80 recipes. To respect copyright laws, we did not accept recipes or photos that were published on internet websites. People also shared photos,

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

We Are Not Silent: Bystander Intervention

A call to Action to Stop Hate and Bias against Asian Communities

Hate crimes and discrimination against Asian communities are on the rise across the US and the world. In this 60-minute webinar, we'll learn how you can intervene effectively as a bystander. This presentation will discuss the disrespect that Asian communities face right now from microaggressions to violence. This interactive presentation will walk through five strategies for intervention: distract, delegate, document, delay, and direct; and how to prioritize your safety while intervening.

In the wake of the numerous attacks on Asian-American residents across the country, WIN hosted a series of courses discussing strategies of solidarity amongst Washington's immigrant communities and a separate succession of courses discussing bystander intervention. The online classes took place during March and April 2021, led by Joanne Lee. These efforts solidify the unified stance WIN maintains in supporting our immigrant members against the fear of violence and discrimination.

Immigrant Celebration – June 2021



On June 8th, 2021, to celebrate Immigrant Heritage, WIN hosted its own Immigrant Celebration Event, titled "Immigrant History is American History". The speakers in attendance included Governor Jay Inslee, who spoke about his efforts to instill a legacy of support for diversity during his term as governor, and Mr. Ron Chew, who spoke about Asian-American



history local to Seattle and his family's own history. Lastly, WIN also presented the long-awaited Diversity Cookbook and several awards to the volunteers who had added significant contributions to WIN's success over the past year.

Ron Chew's Seattle History Tour

On July 31, a group of WIN members enjoyed the personal tour by Mr. Ron Chew learning about the histories of the Seattle ethnic communities. Mr. Chew is an activist, community organizer, and author of several books including My Unforgotten Seattle, and the guest speaker of this year's Immigrant Heritage Month celebration event. Some of the memorable impressions shared by the participants include


"Ron Chew's tour of the Seattle Chinatown/International District was very special and enlightening. Though I have shopped and dined there for many years, I learned that its rich history included not just Asian-American groups but African-Americans and others who lived, labored, struggled, and triumphed there."



"I think the most impactful for me was Canton Alley and Donnie Chin. I remember the media coverage of the shooting and thinking about what a tragedy and senseless murder was. I did not know exactly where it had happened. Walking down the alley, seeing the beautiful tribute to his life is something I will not forget. For me, it brought a community connection like none I have ever experienced. Seeing the bronzed art and beautiful tribute helped

me better understand what an amazing human being he was and how impactful his loss was. It was the most moving part of the tour for me."

"The most memorable story that Ron talked about to me was how many different ethnic backgrounds came to Seattle back in the early 1900s to do whatever it takes and work 12 hour





"At the Hing Hay Park, seeing the names of those 10 Chinese immigrants in a granite memorial who gave their lives fighting for this country during WWII reminded me of the contribution they have made for this country. The sacrifices of the Chinese American soldiers paved the way for repeal of the Chinese Exclusion Act."

"It is our responsibility to capture and ensure our collective history for generations to come. We cannot



rely on public schools to provide this rich local history. Thank you, Ron, for sharing your wisdom and impactful stories about our local immigrant community, as well as your and others' continued efforts to capture and document lived experiences! May we not forget where we came from and/or the history, lest we relive and recreate a painful and damaging future."

And from Mr. Chew: "It was a treat for me to meet members of WIN in person and to be able to share little-known historic vignettes and to describe the struggles of the early immigrants who made the Chinatown-International District into such a rich pan-Asian neighborhood."



Subcommittee Highlights

Professional Development Subcommittee

Over the past year, the subcommittee was able to present to the WIN general membership and the Latino Leadership Network on professional development. We also hosted a WIN social hour, bringing people together with similar career interests to discuss their work with the state.

The first presentation to WIN was a resume-cover letter-interview workshop, hosted by Alejandro and joined by Carolina Sun-Widrow, Board Member with ELUHO, and Lolo Arevalo, Program Manager for Diversity and Recruitment at DOC. With all three panelists having been involved in recruitment and hiring, we were able to discuss tips for strengthening one's application and dispel myths about the hiring process. The audience had great questions for the panel; a particularly apt question was asked, "should an interviewee apologize for their accent?" The answer from the panel was a resounding "no;" immigrants have just as much place in our state's workforce as anyone else.

The second presentation to WIN concerned the role that legal officers play at the Attorney General's office and state agencies, again hosted by Alejandro and joined by Nam Nguyen, AAG. We walked through the reasons why attorneys are brought into agency business and what other state employees can expect when working with their counsel.

The presentation to LLN was a cross-BRG effort. There, Alejandro was joined by Maria Siguenza, Director of CHA, and Ambar Algera, Director of Boards and Commissions with the governor's office. The panel discussed the importance of diversifying our boards and commissions, given their prominent role in setting laws and policies for all Washingtonians.

The social hour was a big success, with WIN members and others joining together for small-group, casual conversations about their time in the state's employ. People were able to share



their positive and negative experiences in their professional development, and of course, network with one another.

Recruitment Subcommittee

The committee worked on preparing the general FAQs for immigrants and state HR professionals which might help to check out some options with state jobs. In collaboration with the Career Development subcommittee team, the committee also presented tips on preparing resumes, cover letters, interviewing skills, and how to apply for state jobs. The committee members reached out to various state agencies' diversity, equity, and inclusion team to inform them about this resource.

WIN's First Internship Opportunity



With WIN's growth to a wider and more inclusive audience, WIN brought on Michael Nepomuceno as part of a pioneering effort to initiate internships across Washington's BRGs. In conjunction with the WorkEx program hosted on Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Michael is a transitioning Army Captain who is spending his final months of federal service under the guidance of WIN's leaders and gaining valuable state workforce experience and connections along the way.

Recognition and Award:

WIN is starting a new tradition of presenting Certificates of Appreciation to those who have demonstrated significant and exemplary contributions throughout the previous year. For 2021, WIN recognizes the Washington State Liquor and Cannabis Board as the *Agency of the Year* award recipient along with three volunteers: Victor Andino, Julie Campos, and Colin Helsley.



Agency of the Year Award - Washington State Liquor and Cannabis Board (WSLCB):



Since WIN's inception, WSLCB has been one of our strongest supporters in the following ways:

- LCB's leadership provided technical assistance during the development of WIN's mentorship program
- WIN used LCB's facilities for our monthly meetings pre-COVID
- LCB made two financial contributions of \$3,500 to WIN's fund. No other funding source came close to these contribution amounts.
- LCB's management encouraged and supported employee participation in WIN activities.
 For example, we have several WIN members who are LCB employees, including Kim Sauer, the 2020/2021 chair of WIN.
- Agency leadership participated in many WIN events including Rick Garza, the agency director. He was one of our first speakers - sharing his family's immigrant history at a monthly meeting. Mr. Garza, along with many other LCB leadership team members, also attended WIN's inaugural ceremony and our 1-year anniversary celebration.
- LCB has actively advocated for WIN (and other BRGs) by educating agency leadership on the value of participation in BRGs for the personal and professional growth of state employees.

Letter from the New Chair (2021-22): Joanne Lee

Mabuhay!

I am honored and humbled to transition into the Chair position this year for the Washington Immigrant Network Business Resource Group for Washington State. I am a Leadership Development Learning Design and Delivery Professional at the WA State Department of Enterprise Services. I immigrated to the United States from the Philippines in December 1992 at age 15, and as you can imagine, that event disrupted my life and shaped my life at a young age. I resumed my studies two weeks after arrival, and I also took my first job at age 16 at a local arts and crafts store, barely speaking English to make a living and help my family financially. Fast forward to my college years, under student loans since my parents couldn't afford it, I started volunteering my time with local organizations that provided educational resources and helped community members. After graduating, I earned my first professional career in Community Development Relations. I reflect on the hardship, the sacrifices for a better life, the acclimation to a new culture and environment, and at the same time, keeping my traditions, values, and roots a vital part of my life.

When I started working for the state four years ago, one of my exceptional leaders encouraged me to join and participate in this business resource group to meet other immigrant state employees who may share similar backgrounds and experiences. I remember attending my first meeting, where I immediately connected with the group members and felt a sense of belonging. I continued to attend WIN's events and gatherings and ended up volunteering my time at WIN. I found myself enjoying the opportunity to connect with other immigrant members from Mexico, East & Southeast Asia, Central & South Asia, Oceana, Europe, Canada, Caribbean, Central & South America, Middle East, North Africa, and Sub-Sahara Africa and our state allies. I learned from them, giving and receiving support through mentorship, and also felt valued and respected for my contributions. WIN has given me a support system, resources, and opportunities to continue growing as a state employee and to be seen, valued, and heard.

Because of my experience, I want to share our purpose and goals to help you understand our business resource group's importance.

First, the purpose of our business resource group is to support the professional development of immigrant state employees through recognition, resource identification, and mentorship.
